For the second year, AFTH was thrilled to participate in the 98.1 WOGL Loves Our Kids Radiothon to help raise money for the Children's Miracle Network at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP).

The two-day event was broadcasted live from the Ryan Seacrest Foundation's "Seacrest


Studios" located at CHOP. Businesses and members of the community came together to raise funds and support this worthy cause.

AFTH was proud to present a \$3,000 check to CHOP in addition to sponsoring a "Power Hour" to help bring in donations from listeners and supporters alike.

This year alone, the radiothon brought in \$662,428.33 and over the past 12 years the donations have totaled more than \$6.2 million dollars. The funds raised through the radiothon each year are earmarked specifically for patient care programs at CHOP. No parent wants to see their child needing hospital care, however in the event that it happened these special programs are a vital part of the healing process, not only for the patient but also for the whole family. Every single child who visits CHOP is eligible for these specific support programs that would not be possible without the funding through the Children's Miracle Network.

AFTH appreciates WOGL for allowing us to again take part and to share in this inspirational event. We thank everyone who called in to make donations during the Adoptions From The Heart Power Hour and we look forward to participating again next year.

some students passing by, and the wonderful Bucks County Community College staff, almost 1,500 purple paper hearts were cut, bundled, and are ready to go for AFTH's annual fundraiser and awareness campaign, The Paper Heart Project.







Almost Tax Time But Still No SSN For Adopted Child... What To Do?

Some of the families who have adopted domestically in 2013 will not finalize before the end of the year which means that their child has not officially been issued a Social Security number yet. So how do those families file their taxes?

The IRS can issue families in these types of situations an Adoption Taxpayer Identification Number (ATIN) which is a temporary nine-digit number for a child who does not have a Social Security Number in time to file taxes. ATIN numbers can be requested through the form W-7A which can be downloaded online at www. irs.gov. Documentation describing how your child was placed with your family via adoption will need to accompany the form. It can take up to eight weeks to receive an ATIN and it is valid for two years and can be used to claim dependency on tax documents.

Consult with your tax preparer if you have additional questions about requesting an ATIN for your child or about the tax credit.

ADOPTION TAX CREDIT REFUNDABILITY ACT OF 2013 (\$1056)/(HR2144) - While the adoption tax credit, enacted in January, included a permanent extension of the credit, it did not make it refundable. As a result, according to the Adoption Tax Credit Working Group, most of the benefit of the credit goes to families making \$100,000 or more per year. The proposed Senate bill and its House companion bill would allow the credit to be refundable.

ADOPTION FRIENDLY WORKPLACE - Prudential Financial, Inc. earned a spot on the Dave Thomas Foundation's "2013 Best Adoption-Friendly Workplaces List." Prudential employees are reimbursed up to \$10,000 per adopted child and receive up to 26 weeks of parental leave. There is no limit on the number of adoptions that can be covered in a year. In addition, Prudential offers counseling services and referral programs to help employees through the adoption process. For employees who are foster parents, the company also provides \$1,000 per calendar year for new, foster care placements.

"Re-Homing" Adoptees After Placement

Recently Reuters ran an article exposing the increasing trend of parents of internationally adopted children - and a few domestic adoptions as well - turning to the internet instead of adoption professionals to find new homes for their children. Usually citing complex behavior issues, some adoptive parents find they are not equipped to cope with the needs of their children and are "marketing them online" in a newly sensationalized process called re-homing. These ill equipped parents are then giving their children to strangers without any background checks, clearances, or education, many of whom go on to abuse or traffic these children. 70% of the children listed on Yahoo or other internet groups were adopted overseas.




Shockingly enough, passing off legal responsibilities of a child can be surprisingly easy. Legal adoptions must be handled through the courts, and prospective parents must be vetted, however there are ways around these legalities. Children can be handed off to new families quickly through a basic "power of attorney" document -a notarized statement declaring the child to be in the care of another adult. This is an extremely dangerous practice, and while not illegal, runs a lot like the child trafficking heard about in other countries.

It is important to point out that these unethical practices are not the majority. However since the article was released, there has been a lot of finger pointing: agencies are being blamed for not providing enough post-placement services; the government for not doing anything to shut these websites down; and the Child Welfare System and the Interstate Compact for not providing the resources to stay on top of these situations.

So why aren't these adoptive parents seeking help from professionals instead of taking matters into their own hands? The stigma of a failed adoption is often seen as "failed parenting" but maybe it's more so a fail of society to help support the parent that is struggling.

While there is no easy fix, the Universal Accreditation Act, which was passed by Congress and due to go into effect in July 2014, will help increase education and professional requirements for international adoption agencies and will help create support services for adopted children. And the Child and Families First Act due to be introduced in congress soon would potentially improve the ability to track placements of children adopted internationally for the purpose of post adoption reports. Both of these are steps in the right direction but we as a society seem to be missing a piece of the puzzle. The judgments we as a society place on parents often leave them feeling hopeless and inferior. Instead of pointing fingers and shifting blame, the focus needs to be on the needs of the children and providing the resources and education necessary for the adoptive parents to manage those specific needs.

If a parent is struggling and they don't feel they can continue to parent a child for any reason, they should contact their county for services or a private agency to help find a new home for the child. It may take more work but it is a safer and better option for the child. Parents in crisis should know that they are not alone and there is help!

Stats, Stats, and Even More Stats...

In AFTH's 2012-2013 fiscal year, there were a total of 141 infants placed in adoptive homes. In addition to that number, we had 3 special needs placements, 2 sets of twins (counted as 1 placement each for stat purposes), and 7 identified placements.

AFTH is thrilled to say that even though we are welcoming new adoptive parents into the books each month, 90% of our families currently in the books have been waiting less than 1 year. Additionally, all but 1 family currently in the books, who are open to children of African-American heritage, have been waiting less than 6 months.

It seems that we are also seeing an increase in our emergency placements in 2013. 40% of our picked families are for emergency placements which is up from 34% in 2012. And 46% of AFTH birthmothers who are selecting families are reporting no drug or alcohol use which is another wonderful stat.

We are also seeing an increase of clinics, hospitals, and planned parenthoods inviting AFTH to host adoption training for their staff. As an agency, we are focusing on building better awareness about adoption and the options that women have when faced with an unplanned pregnancy.

AFTH staff continues to work hard in providing expecting parents all the services and support they need no matter what decision they make in the end as well as continuing to provide counseling, education, and placement services to all of our adoptive parents.

HEARTBEATS - Families continue to show interest in the Heartbeats Embryo Support Services, with several having recently participated in agency-sponsored webinars. The program remains an excellent option for families in which a woman is able to carry an embryo donated by another family. Wait times for matching between recipient and donor families average approximately 1-2 months.

Webinars about AFTH's Embryo Support Services are able to be offered at the convenience of those wishing more details about the program. This webinar is a great way to learn about the program and to ask any questions you may have regarding the process.

The next Embryo Education Series will be offered in January and February. These webinars address talking with children about embryo placement, potential contact with genetic relatives, and many other related topics. Please visit AFTH's online calendar at www.afth.org to register for this series.

International Adoption News

AFTH prides itself on keeping abreast of news and legislation regarding intercountry adoption. The agency continues to provide Home Studies, Education, Post-Adoption/Placement Reports and Services, and other assistance in support of international adoptions, despite no longer having placement programs in foreign countries. AFTH collaborates with many agencies across the

United States that do provide intercountry adoption placement services. Please contact your local AFTH office to see how we can help you with your adoption process, including referring you to one of these partner agencies. Ethiopia: Effective September 1, 2013, the Government of Ethiopia began requiring all adoption cases filed on behalf of U.S. prospective adoptive parents with the Ethiopian courts to undergo the U.S. Pre-Adoption Immigration Review (PAIR) process. Ethiopia's Ministry of Women, Children, and Youth Affairs has confirmed that the new criterion will not affect the 70 U.S. cases with open applications that were still pending with its Federal First Instance Court as of that time. The purpose of PAIR is to allow U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to assess and make a preliminary determination of a child's likely eligibility for U.S. immigration benefits before Ethiopian courts finalize an adoption decree. While this process is designed to ensure that an adoptee will be eligible for a U.S. immigrant visa prior to his/ her adoption, it is also expected to add a number of weeks to adoption processes.

Guatemala: A Virginia family, for which AFTH is the Home Study provider, was finally able to bring their son home from Guatemala in September. This was more than 6 years after they initially received his referral in 2007. AFTH offers its congratulations to this persistent and dedicated family, and its hope that the approximately 115 other "pipeline" cases across the U.S. from prior to 2008 will soon be resolved. Since 2008 American citizens have been unable to initiate an application to adopt an orphaned child from Guatemala.

Haiti: The Haitian Chamber of Deputies passed a new adoption law on August 29, 2013. This law has now been passed by both houses of the Haitian government, and speculation is that it may be implemented in the fall as Haiti moves toward becoming a member-country of the Hague Convention.

Under the new law, prospective adoptive applicants will need to meet eligibility criteria such as:

- Being between the ages of 30-50 for couples, or between the ages of 35-50 for singles
- At least 5 years of marriage or cohabitation for heterosexual couples

Also of important note is that from among the more than 1,000 Haitian children who came to the U.S. on Humanitarian Parole visas following the earthquake in Haiti in 2010, 244 have not yet applied for U.S. citizenship or permanent residency. It is imperative that their families do so prior to the expiration of the Help Haiti Act on December 9, 2013, in order to avoid these children becoming subject to deportation. Any potentially impacted families are urged to speak with a USCIS "Help Haiti" officer by contacting the U.S. National Benefits Center at 877-424-8374.

Mexico: The Mexican Central Adoption Authority gave notification in August that it had granted authorization to 5 additional U.S.-based adoption agencies. This brings the total number of U.S. adoption service providers authorized in Mexico to 11. At the same time, however, and as is sadly the case with so many other countries, the number of adoptions from Mexico to the U.S. has fallen for 5 consecutive years, from 105 in 2008 to only 21 in 2012.

Vietnam: In September, the Department of Adoptions in Vietnam's Ministry of Justice (MOJ) issued guidance regarding its July announcement that it would accept applications from U.S. adoption agencies to provide adoption services in Vietnam. The MOJ stated that it will license 2 U.S. adoption service providers in 2014 to operate a proposed, limited intercountry adoption program of children with special needs, older children, and children in sibling groups. Adoptions from Vietnam to the U.S. have been "closed" since the expiration of the Memorandum of Understanding between the two countries in September of 2008.

Exchange Student Sharing Culture with Adoptees



"She looks like me!" Hannah said. "No, she looks like me!", James said. "She looks like both of you!" I said. Hannah and James were referring to our exchange student Ainur Akhmetova from Kazakhstan, who we are hosting this school year.

Ainur is a high school exchange student who has come to experience

American culture first hand for an entire school year. She's here to improve her English, make American friends and share her culture and customs.

As the regional coordinator of International Student Exchange, our family has hosted students before- Sara from Montenegro, Marika from Sweden-- but finally having a student from the country our children are adopted from has taken on a whole new meaning. We are finally getting to learn more about the country they come from, their culture, and their language. For families who also adopted from Kazakhstan, you'll remember how it was while we were over there. While in country for 4-6 weeks, we were told not to talk to any of the locals. Don't tell anyone why you're there, as some folks don't like the idea of foreigners adopting their children. While some people think we are doing a good thing, other folks think we are adopting the children for their body parts or taking them away from their country therefore losing their culture. There are many misconceptions with international adoption in Kazakhstan and you never know the thoughts with folks you might be talking with so it was better to keep a low profile. That being said, we never really got to know the culture well while in country. We only got to know it through our coordinator's eyes, fellow adoptive families, or through the caregivers at the orphanage. And while the Baby House in Kostanai, (where our daughter is from), was very open in talking with caregivers, in Uralsk, (where our son is from), it was not.

So now we get the chance to learn directly about Kazakh culture right here in our home.

Ainur has tried her hand at baking Kazakh bread, although she doesn't cook. She's teaching our kids Russian words, and explaining Kazakh culture to our family.

To make it extra special, Ainur is from Kostanai, the same city my daughter is adopted from! When I show her photos of my adoption trip to Kostanai, she says "Oh yes, I know that building!" or of a nice street view "oh wow! My friend lives in that apartment!"

The world is very small and again and again I realize how we are all connected. Case in point, when her mom first saw my photo she said she remembered seeing me in a restaurant 9 years ago in Kostanai! Our coordinator used to take us to various restaurants and there were not many Americans back then in Kostanai so it's quite likely she did. Of course, I joke that if the person her mom saw was rude and obnoxious, then of course it was not me!

Hosting an exchange student is a rewarding experience and a chance for lifelong friendships across the world, but an even more rewarding experience hosting a student from your adoptive country. I encourage families to give it a go. Don't feel you need to wait until your children are teens. Start now while they are young.

It's an eye opener for them to learn about the world, connect to their birth country, or to learn about a new country they know nothing about. Remember the world is small and we are all connected.
