

New York Birthfather Rights

- 1. You, as the birthfather, will have to sign consent to the adoption. If you are married or were married during the year before your baby is born, you will be asked to give your consent whether or you are the father of the baby.
- 2. Once you give your consent to an adoption, you can change your mind, but it must be done in writing 30 days from the date you signed your consent, and it must be delivered to the agency office (or to Family Court or to the attorney handling the adoption). Whatever your decision, about to two to three months after the birth of your baby, there will be a hearing at the courthouse. You will receive a letter giving you the date and time of the hearing which you may or may not have to attend. * * If you are under the age of 18, one of your parents will be notified of the court hearing. The law requires that you be notified of the hearing.

Other Important Information

- You cannot accept money for your child to be placed for adoption.
- Adoption parents can pay for housing and living expenses for the last 2 months of pregnancy
 and the first month after deliver as well as any medical expenses. Birth Fathers are not entitled
 to any reimbursements in NY they are entitled to free counseling only.
- If the legal fees or medical expenses are paid for by adopting parents, this does not mean that you must place your baby with the adopting parents. If you change your mind, you do not have to repay them unless you have agreed to do so.
- You have the right to have counseling about whether or not to choose adoption for your baby.
 This counseling must be provided, at no cost to you, by an agency or counselor on the court's approved list. Your can get this list at the hospital where you are having your baby.
- Adoptions are legal in New York when done through an agency, or when done privately with an attorney. Agencies, however, provide free counseling as part of their services.

In Addition: You have the right,

- o To have counseling to help you with your decision.
- o To have counseling even after your rights have been terminated
- o To select and meet the adoptive family.
- o To ask to get letters and pictures of your child after placement.
- To get help from the hospital social worker:
 - About your decision
 - o If someone is bothering or pressuring you
 - o For a list of adoption agencies and counselors in your area
